#### Lessons Learned / Guiding Principles

- Focus on what you can control
- Set the boundary
- Traveling to-and-from school is #1 issue
- Accuracy over speed
- Centralized intake and output
- Use your community-based partners and their expertise
- Project confidence and calm



#### Proactive INTERNAL Preparedness

- Set clear protocols for Principals, School Clerks, and Security Staff for the following scenarios and support with training:
  - Interactions with federal agents
  - Incident on school grounds or near school
  - Incident in the surrounding community
  - Student stranded due to detention of parent/guardian
- Create master google doc (editable by central office staff so school leaders have most-up-to-date information)
- Set up centralized hotline for receiving calls from SCHOOL LEADERS not public



#### Proactive EXTERNAL Preparedness

- Establish comms response protocol
  - Be clear who needs to sign off vs. who just needs to be aware
  - Create template letters for schools to send home to families; proactively translate templates to cut down on time when the moment comes
  - Create rapid response email group to make sure everyone's in the loop
- Create centralized web page with information Aggregate resources from other government partners, CBOs and nonprofits doing work
- Establish attendance policy and work with staff to make sure Google Classroom or similar tool is in use to support students who are absent
- Support principals with generic comms tools



#### Response Protocol

- Incident Reported
  - Direct to Safety Center if report came to another department
- Safety Center notifies local law enforcement, senior leadership, and comms
- Comms creates letter based on best-available information, circulates internally for signoff and awareness
- Once approved, comms provides letter to school leader, works with school leader to edit and translate if necessary
- After letter is sent, media team provides letter in lieu of formal statement



### Activity Near School

## If federal agents are on school property or on the same block as the school during arrival or dismissal: Call CPS Safety Center Hotline

The CPS communications team will also be notified to provide support.

#### **Arrival:**

- Welcome students and staff into school as they arrive; if federal representatives attempt to enter the school, defer to regular guidance for this scenario.
- If necessary, without causing alarm, staff should direct students and families to another entrance to drop off their student(s) at the school.

#### Dismissal:

- Immediately bring students and staff inside the building and initiate a Soft Lockdown:
  - Use judgment re: letting parents/guardians into the building
  - Secure exterior doors
  - Do not allow anyone in or out of the building until the area is clear.



#### Immigration-Related Resources

#### cps.edu/immigration

- DOES NOT ask for our families' immigration status
- WILL NOT coordinate with federal immigration enforcement agencies, including Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE)
- DOES NOT share student records with ICE or any other federal representatives, except in the rare case where there is a court order or consent from the parent/guardian
- WILL NOT allow ICE agents or any other federal representatives access to CPS facilities unless they produce a criminal judicial warrant signed by a federal judge







#### Media Relations

- Media team often supplies community response letter in lieu of official statement
- If media arrives at school, CPS:
  - Sends a staff person to manage media
  - Enforces keeping media coverage in "the public way" (sidewalk) vs. on school grounds
  - Advises principals and District leaders regarding participation in any news conference
